Ash Wednesday Introduction February 26, 2020

Introduction

On Ash Wednesday we begin our forty-day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance. Marking our foreheads with dust, we acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return." While not included in the texts for the day, to remember we are dust, is also to remember that in the beginning God created humanity "from the dust of the ground." We are God-formed, God-breathed dust! At the same time, the dust traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ, already created and formed anew in grace. We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that "now is the day of salvation." Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world. (adapted from Sundays and Seasons, https://members.sundaysandseasons.com)

Lectionary/Themes

Joel 2:1-2, 12-17 Imagine the scene. The trumpet sounds rebounding from the heights of the hill where a walled city; a fortress sits high for all to see. And the people gather and wait to hear a message from the king. "Declare a fast, fall on your knees in ashes and repentance. Return to the Lord your God!" The edict seems out of character from a king who has demanded the fealty and worship of his people; who has commanded them to kneel before him. But the horses ride out, the ravens are sent, the message spreads throughout the kingdom. And we watch as an entire nation falls to their knees to fast and pray, to turn away from their sin. It is an epic scene. And yet the setting begins with an odd contrast. "I don't want your ceremony," says the Lord. "I am not interested in people who bow the knee simply because they are commanded. I am not interested in outward appearances of worship and remorse. But give me your hearts." And before we think this is just another king who wants to be worshipped for worship's sake; the reason we return to the Lord, is because this God is gracious. This God is merciful. This God is slow to anger. OUR GOD is abounding in steadfast love. In the midst of the Ashes of Ash Wednesday, the focus is not on our repentance, but on a God of grace who desires nothing more than the life and love of all people.

Psalm 51 "Create in Me a Clean Heart O God." Perhaps the most penitent Psalm in the scripture, it comes from a place of deep humility. A heart-wrenching confession of sin, that acknowledges we do not deserve forgiveness and yet we ask for it anyway; turning to the only place where true forgiveness and grace can be found—in God. As in the

reading from Joel, the theme continues. God's love is steadfast, unshakable, everlasting, and eternal.

2 Corinthians 5:20b-6:10 Paul's urging to the Corinthian church, "Do not receive God's grace in vain, for now is the time of God's favor, now is the day of salvation." In the midst of struggle, hardship, persecution, beatings, imprisonment the church at Corinth has lost hope in God. Paul's encouragement is to "carry on carrying on;" that in fact God's grace is not in vain, so be reconciled to God. How? "In hard work, sleepless nights and hunger; in purity, understanding, patience and kindness; in the Holy Spirit and in sincere love; in truthful speech and in the power of God; with weapons of right-eousness..." It seems a daunting list and we can quickly forget what Paul sets forth. That these things do not save us, but in these things God is revealed, in these things, we understand the riches of grace come to us in Christ, who "had no sin, yet became sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God."

Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21 The Gospel of Matthew echoes the text from Joel; that fasting and praying and giving alms for the sake of outward appearances is not what God requires or desires. That if the motivation for spiritual practices is our glory, fame, notoriety, etc., then these are the things we seek and what we ultimately treasure and worship. Be careful. For this treasure is fickle and fleeting and easily destroyed. "But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Main Themes

We are yet a people who rely on ourselves, our actions and spiritual practices, on outward appearances that in the end are shallow and fleeting. This day calls us to turn away even from worship practices and traditions that bring us a false sense of security, that now we are "good with God." God is not moved by our practices, but longs for relationship with us. As we kneel before God marked in ashes, the readings encourage, call, ache, for our return to God and God alone who is faithful. God who is gracious and merciful. God who is abounding in steadfast love.

Alternatives for Smaller Congregations

It is true that in some smaller congregations and communities it becomes difficult to gather people together for evening worship, particularly if there has already been a Shrove Tuesday gathering the night before. Creativity and flexibility are often the best suggestion. Plan an afternoon worship time. Or alternatively, combine the Shrove Tuesday meal with an Ash Wednesday focus. Plan for this on whichever evening works best in your setting. Less important is whether it is Tuesday or Wednesday. More important to provide the opportunity for reflection, prayer, and the imposition of ashes. Suggested ideas for prep as follows:

Setting up the Space for a combined evening

Ahead of the Shrove Tuesday meal set the worship space to invite a quiet and reflective atmosphere. Dimmed lights with several lit candles can set the tone. A pianist may want to play seasonally appropriate hymns softly during the reflection time. Or alternatively, other recorded music can be played.

Prepare several stations using the petitions from the Confession of Sin found on pg. 253 in the hymnal. For instance:

"Our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us, we confess to you. Have mercy on us O God."

Print the petition in larger print and display it in a picture frame, etc. At the station include photos of creation—both in its beauty and in the ways we pollute and destroy our environment. Perhaps include resources about environmental stewardship, pamphlets on ways to reduce our carbon footprint, etc.

For a petition on lack of love for neighbor and those who are different include photos of local refugee families and their stories, or reflections from the homeless in your town, etc. Be creative. Include the petitions that are most meaningful to your setting and adapt your display according to topic. You may also include related scripture, or include stations with select verses from the Ash Wednesday lectionary along with summaries of the themes of the text. For the final station print the Ash Wednesday focus and call from Joel, "Return to the Lord your God who is gracious and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love."

As you share the Shrove Tuesday meal announce that people may move through the stations following the meal as they are ready. At the final station have two people ready to apply the ashes inviting people to either stand or kneel. As the ashes are applied, speak the words, "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Have pre-printed papers with the spoken liturgy as found on ELW pg. 254 that can be repeated by leaders and those who come following the imposition of ashes. Accomplish in us, O God, the work of your salvation.

That we may show forth your glory in the world.

By the cross and passion of your Son, our Saviour,

Bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection. Amen.

The openness and invitation of this kind of setting led to surprises in my own congregation. A 75 year old man who had never participated in Ash Wednesday before asked for an explanation of the meaning of the ashes and then came for the first time. Sunday School children asked if they could apply the ashes too, and children were marking the heads of their parents and grandparents and Sunday School teachers. Be open to the Spirit's leading and work among the people who gather.

Ashes

If you have used palm branches for the previous year's Palm Sunday procession, plan to include a "Burning of the Palms" rite either on the last Sunday of Epiphany (Transfiguration Sunday), or just prior to the Shrove Tuesday meal so that the ashes can be prepared in advance for the imposition. The burning is best done outdoors to avoid smoke detectors and the dangers of smoke and fire. In the church parking lot or even at a campsite where the congregation may gather for a wiener roast following, and where the fire and smoke and embers continue to connect and evoke reflection on the burning of the ashes.

Dried palms are crushed and placed in a large coffee can. A rite for burning of the ashes follows.

If not burning palm branches from previous years, ashes can be purchased at a church supply store. Ensure enough time for order and delivery.



Imposition of Ashes

In times of great sorrow and heartache, God's people of old would wear their grief. With sackcloth and ashes, their outward form reflected the reality of their hearts. Tonight we too wear ashes as a sign of our brokenness. We acknowledge our need. We confess our sin—the excuses that have kept us from being made whole. We come in our desire to be created anew, our longing to be made well.

After the fire has raged and the flames have died away and grown cold, nothing remains but ashes.

We are dust and to dust we shall return.

After the hot passion of sin, after to cool calculation of evil, all that remains is brokenness and ashes.

We are dust and to dust we shall return.

After the zeal for living has ebbed away and life has run its course, there is nothing left but ashes.

We are dust, and to dust we shall return.

But the ashes are not the end. Smeared in ashes we fall to our knees.

Washed in waters of grace we rise.

In the depths of sorrow we enter.

In Christ we rise with confidence and hope.

In the frailty of dust we begin.

Created anew, we rise to resurrection and life.

O Lord, we are but dust and ashes. But ashes are not the end. For out of the dust of the ground you form us anew. Over the ashes of our life you breathe your breath, and we rise to life in you.

Thanks be to God!

Traced in the sign of the cross, the ashes point not only to the reality of who we are, but call us to repent—to return to the cross of Christ—the place where our sin is forgiven, the place of our healing, the place where Jesus, arms open wide, pours out his life for us. This day, as you come to receive the ashes, the invitation of Christ for us: "Come, be made well."

Lent 1 March 1

Introduction

Today's gospel tells of Jesus' temptation in the desert. His forty-day fast becomes the basis of our Lenten pilgrimage. In the early church Lent was a time of intense preparation for those to be baptized at the Easter Vigil. This catechetical focus on the meaning of faith is at the heart of our Lenten journey to the baptismal waters of Easter. Hungry for God's mercy, we receive the bread of life to nourish us for the days ahead. (Sundays and Seasons, https://members.sundaysandseasons.com)

Lectionary/Themes

Genesis 2:15-17, 3:1-7 God places Adam and Eve in the garden to "till it and keep it." In our context where climate change is a topic of great concern and controversy, this text calls us to wonder at what it means to "keep" God's garden and all God has created good. God sets limits for Adam and Eve and for us. In the garden humanity is given the gift of fruit in abundance. When we set our eyes and hearts on that which is beyond our grasp, gift quickly turns to resource in a world where everything is ours for the picking. Adam and Eve's actions and the serpent's words are at the heart of this text, "Did God really say...?" Can God be trusted in both gift and limitation?

Psalm 32 "Happy are they whose transgressions are forgiven and who sin is put away." While Lent is a more sombre time in the church year, this Psalm turns our focus away from ourselves to what God is doing—forgiving sin, bringing us to life and love and relationship with one another and with God! Happy are we!

Romans 5:12-19 "One man's act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all." We can quickly get bogged down in St. Paul's explanation of Adam's originating sin that becomes the sin of the world and the forensic acts of justification that come through the acts of "One Man;" Jesus. Yet the focus of this text is the same focus as Psalm 32: What God is doing—the "free gift" of Jesus, of forgiveness and life!

Matthew 4:1-11 Jesus is led by the Spirit into the wilderness where Jesus meets the devil and knows every human temptation—hunger, power, wealth, glory, identity, a secure future. In this text we hear echoes of the same question that haunted Adam and Eve: "Did God say??? Can God be trusted?"" Didn't God say he would send angels to protect you? *If* you *are* the Son of God... But then again maybe you're not. Can you trust yourself God?

Main Themes: Forgiveness and life that comes all ways and always in the free gift of God through Christ. Even in the face of everything that says otherwise—God is faithful! God can be trusted! We are forgiven!

O God most mighty, O God most merciful, O God our rock and our salvation, hear us as we praise, hear us as we pray, call us to your table, grant us your life. We praise you for the grace shown to your people in every age: the promise to Israel, the rescue from Egypt, the gift of the promised land, the words of the prophets, and, at this end of all ages, the gift of your Son, who proclaimed good news in word, and deed, who was obedient to your will, through the giving of his life, granted the people your life.

O God of our wilderness, you journey with us in struggle and joy, in our hunger and thirst, in loneliness and the barrenness of this world in the gift of Jesus your Son, our Saviour and Lord. Born among the poor, tempted as we were, Jesus suffered hunger and thirst, longed for love, lived under oppression, and was betrayed by those closest to him. In his passion for life Jesus reached out to heal the sick and suffering, proclaiming good news in word and deed. Obedient to your will, and in infinite love, taking up the cross of our death, Jesus granted the people your life.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, gave thanks, broke it and gave it to his disciples saying, "Take and eat, this is my body given for you." Lent 2 March 8

Introduction

During Lent we journey with all those around the world who will be baptized at the Easter Vigil. In today's gospel Jesus tells Nicodemus that he must be born of water and Spirit. At the font we are given a new birth as children of God. As God made a covenant with Abraham, in baptism God promises to raise us up with Christ to new life. From worship we are sent forth to proclaim God's love for all the world. (Sundays and Seasons, https://members.sundaysandseasons.com)

Lectionary/Themes

Genesis 12:1-4a God's promise to Abraham, "I will make of you a great nation." This is a very specific promise; yet not for Abraham alone; and not only for a chosen nation or God's chosen people alone. The blessing of God extends beyond Abraham and Sarah, beyond the Israelites to become a blessing for all nations and people: "I will bless you so that you may be a blessing." And, "Through you all the families of the earth shall be blessed." The context of the Gospel of Matthew harks us back to this text as in Matthew 1 the genealogy of Abraham is traced through the generations to the birth of Jesus, the Messiah through whom all generations have been and will be blessed. How have we embraced (or fail to embrace) the vision and promise of God that extends to all nations and peoples?

Psalm 121 "I lift my eyes to the hills; from where is my help to come?" The answer penned by the Psalmist echoes God's promise to Abraham and to all generations: "The LORD will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life. The LORD will keep your going out and your coming in from this time on and forevermore." As an alternative to the Psalm for today, "I Lift My Eyes Up," Brian Doerksen can be sung or serve as "bookends" to the spoken Psalm.

Romans 4:1-5, 13-17 "For this reason it depends on faith in order that the promise may rest on grace." Using Abraham as the example Paul argues that God's promise cannot rest on works; that reliance on works would make faith irrelevant and God's promise null and void. So as "Abraham believed and it was reckoned to him as righteousness," so for us too, the promise of God rests completely on grace.

John 3:1-17 "Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit." Belonging comes through birth; and that through water and the Spirit of God. Try as we might we cannot enter the womb twice, nor can we decide our birthday, our birth family, or even to be born at all. Birth is completely beyond our control. So it is with the kingdom of God. We are birthed by God.

Main Themes: The readings today call into question our culture that still bases our value on merit, hard work, intellect, wealth, and even the family we are born into. And not only our culture but the church too. Debunked in our readings is any kind of decision

theology—the idea that we can accept Jesus as our personal Saviour; that we have faith because we decided to, or worked really hard at it. But in God's kingdom culture, we are "born" children of water and Spirit through God's grace only; by God's decision alone.

Lent 3 March 15

Introduction

In today's gospel the Samaritan woman asks Jesus for water, an image of our thirst for God. Jesus offers living water, a sign of God's grace flowing from the waters of baptism. The early church used this gospel and those of the next two Sundays to deepen baptismal reflection during the final days of preparation before baptism at Easter. As we journey to the resurrection feast, Christ comes among us in word, bath, and meal—offering us the life-giving water of God's mercy and forgiveness. (Sundays and Seasons, https://members.sundaysandseasons.com)

Lectionary/Themes

Exodus 17:1-7 The Israelites' journey in the wilderness is harsh often leaving them wanting for the day to day necessities of life. And today the life-threatening reality: there is no water to drink. But we know that God has already provided in the wilderness. When they were hungry there was manna. And when the Israelites bored of God's gift then there were quail. Now once again, the Israelites complain. And we want to say, "Give your head a shake. God has and is already providing, will God not also give you water to drink?" The pattern is predictable not only for the Israelites, but for us too. And even as the people whine and complain and turn away, already God is opening up ways in the wilderness, opening up the rocks of the ground to spring forth with water. In our world where many people do not have clean drinking water and where water is bottled as a commodity; this text reminds us how we still turn away from God's gifts towards "the slavery of Egypt," and the models of hoarding and greed. The challenge of this text is poignant: Does God yet provide for all the earth?

Psalm 95 "Come let us sing to the Lord!" A hymn of praise, this Psalm juxtaposes the complaints of the Israelites and our complaints too, and calls us to recall God's love and care celebrated by all creation. For those who dislike the sombreness of Lent, this joyful Psalm boldly declares the joy and focus of this rich Season that directs us back to God's mercy and love for all. A joyful sung alternative to speaking the Psalm for this day can be found in the Morning Prayer service, pg. 300-301; where Psalm 95 is set to music.

Romans 5:1-11 "Since we are justified by faith we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." If we are not careful we might be quick to overlook one small word that proves the turning point of Paul's letter to the Romans. While it is our human tendency to find our value and place through what we have done, Paul says "Since..." A word that signals what has gone before and that leads to what comes next. Since we are justified (not by works, not by fasting, or prayer, or daily devotion); but since we are justified by faith (that is pure gift from God); since we are justified by God's work alone what follows is peace with God even in harsh wilderness times when it seems God does not care; even when we turn away from God to the slavery of this world; since God has and does... we are reconciled, saved, brought to life in Christ.

John 4:5-42 A very familiar text; Jesus crosses all conventional boundaries: Jews would avoid Samaritan territory but Jesus walks right in. Men did not have open conversations with women alone in public but Jesus engages with a woman at a well. The woman with unarguably a "colourful" past, an outcast of society, and considered outside of God's grace is welcomed by Jesus; given living water. And a woman who had no voice or authority is transformed into a witness of God's forgiveness, grace, and life to the very ones who have excluded her. The radical grace of God for all comes in the words of Jesus, "The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life." With the woman at the well may our response be, "Sir, give me this water always."

Main Themes Our default is to turn away from God to things that keep us bound. God's default is to give us all things: manna, quail, water, forgiveness, life; and all as the free gift of God through Christ. Even in the face of everything that says otherwise—God is faithful! God can be trusted! We are forgiven, nourished, and quenched! Thanks be to God!

Lent 4 March 22

Introduction

Baptism is sometimes called enlightenment. The gospel for this Sunday is the story of the man born blind healed by Christ. "I was blind, now I see," declares the man. In baptism God opens our eyes to see the truth of who we are: God's beloved children. As David was anointed king of Israel, in baptism God anoints our head with oil, and calls us to bear witness to the light of Christ in our daily lives. (Sundays and Seasons, https://members.sundaysandseasons.com)

Lectionary/Themes

1 Samuel 16:1-13 God has chosen a king to rule over Israel and sends Samuel to the house of Jesse of Bethlehem to anoint whom he has chosen. As Samuel looks at all of Jesse's sons, he looks to their strength, height, and appearance—the qualities he thinks will make a good King. But God has someone else in mind. The youngest son, small, a shepherd, untrained in the ways of war and the world. As our readings today focus on sight and blindness, this story of David, too, challenges our own sight and blindness as God declares, "For the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart."

Psalm 23 Likely the most beloved Psalm of all and popularly used at funerals, Psalm 23 takes on a different light as we think of David the Shepherd in the day-to-day, wrestling with lions and bears, fleeing a vengeful king who wants to take his life, and a wilderness world that threatens on every side. Not only a Psalm of hope of life through death and after, Psalm 23 speaks into our lives of God who is ever-present with us through all the ever-present dangers of life in this world.

Ephesians 5:8-14 "Everything that becomes visible is light." A profound statement—not only that everything becomes visible *in* the light, but everything that becomes visible *is* light. The readings chosen for today continue to push the boundaries of what defines true sight. Dark things are dark. But things seen are light by their very nature. How do we live as light in the darkness of our world?

John 9:1-41 The story of a man born blind now healed by Jesus is complicated by the religious rulers who get hung up because Jesus heals on the Sabbath. Jesus cuts through all the convoluted darkness and the inability of those to see what this healing really means. "I came into this world so that those who do not see may see, and those who do see may become blind." And we understand this gospel to be about so much more than the physical capability to see. Beyond seeing with eyes, it is about seeing with the heart, seeing in faith, seeing who is right before our eyes—Jesus. The Pharisees who still can't see respond with a question of their own, a question that is for all of us, "Surely we are not blind, are we?"

Main Themes Darkness and light. Blindness and sight. Where and in what do we see Jesus at work in our world?

Introduction

In today's gospel Jesus reveals his power over death by raising Lazarus from the dead. The prophet Ezekiel prophesies God breathing new life into dry bones. To those in exile or living in the shadows of death, these stories proclaim God's promise of resurrection. Breath, Spirit, Flesh, Bone, Life!! It is the promise made to us in baptism: we die with Christ that we might also be raised with him to new life. (adapted from Sundays and Seasons, https://members.sundaysandseasons.com)

Lectionary/Themes

Ezekiel 37:1-14 "Can these bones live?" The answer is found in this powerful and vivid description of the Valley of the Dry bones. A pile of bones. Remnants in a heap that cannot be sorted or separated into the lives that once were; that cannot be discerned or named for the people who once were. Prophesy! Says the Lord. And now we hear them rattling, bone upon bone. Separating and sorting and coming together. And we see the flesh forming and attaching, sinew to sinew. But still they are lifeless, inanimate, unknown. But once more the command rings out! Prophesy! And we hear the rush of wind—it is breath! And they rise up to breathe, and there is life! I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live! It is God's promise to us in the cross of Christ, in the waters of our baptism—Spirit, Breath, Life! As an alternative, the dramatic reading included later in this document may be used.

Psalm 130 "Out of the depths I cry to you." With Ezekiel, the Psalmist states the truth of our lives in the depths of sin and darkness. That on our own we cannot stand, but with God there is forgiveness of sin. With God there is steadfast love. With God, in God alone there is life.

Romans 8:6-11 "Can these bones live?" Does flesh makes us alive? Paul echoes the truth of Ezekiel. That flesh and bone does not constitute life. But only Spirit. In this text from Romans, once again we hear the rattling of bones. Once again we see flesh attaching, sinew to sinew. Once again we hear the rush of breath in the resounding promise, "..he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through the Spirit that dwells in you."

John 11:1-45 A scene of death. The agony of loss and grief. The tears of Jesus show us the depth of grief Christ shares with us as we stare at a tomb with a stone rolled in place. Martha states the blunt reality: the stench of death is overwhelming and cannot be overcome. But Jesus is not willing to give death the final word but calls and commands us with a loud voice, "Come out! Come out of the tomb and live!" God has the final word. It is resurrection. It is life. As the darkness of Lent deepens and we prepare

for Holy Week and the cross and death of Jesus, the resurrection of Lazarus foreshadows what is to come in Jesus who is "the Resurrection and the Life." Of interest...the last sentence of this reading includes a command from Jesus to the community, "Unbind him and let him go." The command stands as invitation and role of the church to participate in God's life-giving activity in the world.

Main Themes: Dry bones and death. Resurrection and breath. God's command and desire to fill us with breath, to raise us from death so that all may live.

WORD

First Reading Ezekiel 37:1-14 (a dramatic reading of the Valley of Dry Bones follows. It can be read by two alternating voices or the congregation can take the voice of God. The people

rubbing their hands together makes the sound of the rattling of the bones and the blowing of the breath of God. The rattling grows in intensity starting with a few hands then with the whole. People can be divided into sections with leaders for each section. Section 1 begins, then section 1 and 2 and so on as the rattling builds in intensity throughout. The readers voice increases with volume and intensity as the sound increases.)

The hand of the LORD came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the LORD and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. The Lord led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. And the Lord said to me,

"Mortal, can these bones live?"

I answered, "O Lord God, you know." 4Then God said to me,

"Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the LORD. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; (read with louder intensity) and you shall know that I am the LORD."

(Reader leaves a pause of silence, then continues in a quieter tone)...and you shall know that I am the LORD." So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise,

(Section 1 rubbing hands together)

a rattling, (read with louder intensity, Sections 1 and 2 rubbing hands together)

and the bones came together, (read with louder intensity, Sections 1, 2 and 3 rubbing hands together)

bone to its bone. (read with louder intensity, Sections 1, 2 3, and 4 rubbing hands together)

(Reader leaves a pause of silence, then continues in a quieter tone)

I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them. Then the Lord said to me,

"Prophesy to the breath, (Section 1 rubbing hands together)

prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: (read with louder intensity, Sections 1 and 2 rubbing hands together)

Thus says the Lord GoD: Come from the four winds, O breath, (read with louder intensity, Sections 1, 2 and 3 rubbing hands together)

and breathe upon these slain, that they may live." (read with louder intensity, Sections 1, 2 3, and 4 rubbing hands together)

(Reader with increased excitement with each phrase)

I prophesied as the Lord commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude.

(All people stomp their feet like rumbling)

Then the Lord said to me.

"Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely.' Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord God: I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people; and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. And you shall know that I am the LORD,

(reader, quieter tone) And you shall know that I am the LORD,

And you shall know that I am the LORD, when I open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people. I will put my spirit within you,

(reader, quieter tone) I will put my spirit within you

and you shall live,

(reader, quieter tone) and you shall live

and I will place you on your own soil;

then you shall know that I, the LORD, have spoken and will act,

(reader, quieter tone) then you shall know that I, the LORD, have spoken and will act,

(reader, very soft and intentional!) says the LORD."

Be the breath of encouragement and strength to all who put the good of others before themselves: local law enforcement, health care workers, teachers, and those who serve in our grocery stores and gas stations. Be the flesh of everyday hands and make us servants of this community. Lord in your mercy, **Hear our prayer.**

Holy and gracious God, pour out your Spirit upon this congregation. Be the breath of blessing blowing through those who love and care for us; for the generations who have gone before as faithful witnesses to your love; for those we have loved and lost; and for those who now grace our lives. Stitch us together sinew to sinew, be the flesh of our faith and love rising to life in service to those we meet. Lord in your mercy, **Hear our prayer.**

Trusting in your abundant mercy, O God, we commend ourselves and all for whom we pray into your care, through Jesus Christ our Savior and Lord. **Amen.**
