Thanksgiving for Baptism

In the Lutheran tradition, we often start worship with either Confession and Forgiveness or Thanksgiving for Baptism. I think that any time we can acknowledge our messiness and imperfections in church is good. It is such a relief to start worship knowing I'm in a room full of imperfect people who are also sinners and have also made mistakes. Publicly sharing that together is a great way to start our time with God. It is great to understand how messy we are, how the world hurts us, and that we need God in our lives. Enjoy this liturgy. - Pastor Thom Johnson

P: Blessed be the holy Trinity, + one God, the fountain of living water, the rock who gave us birth, our light and our salvation.

C: Amen.

P: People of God, in the baptismal waters we travel with Christ from death to life. Our past, our sin, our failure, our doubt, and our shame are drowned and gone here.

C: You, O God, wash us clean.

P: Our fear, our confusion, our self-righteousness, our despair -- ALL are washed away by grace.

C: You, O God, wash us clean.

P: Our pride, our hypocrisy, and other people's opinions of us no longer have the power to define us.

C: You, O God, give us new life.

P: The Spirit lives and moves through us now, a great and joyful mystery, so we may bring love and mercy into the world as the body of Christ.

C: You, O God, give us new life.

P: Rejoice that God has claimed us in this baptismal grace, not by our own doing or believing but by God's mercy alone.

C: You, O God, give us new life.

P: And so, as we begin worship, we give thanks to God for the gracious gift of baptism that joins us together in Christ by the Spirit's power. Joined to Christ in the waters of baptism, we are clothed with God's mercy and forgiveness. We praise you for the gift of new life in Jesus Christ. To you be given honor and praise through Jesus Christ our Lord in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever. **C: Amen.**

Eucharistic Prayer

Here at the table we see most clearly that we are part of the Body of Christ. We are no longer divided into people of different ages, different ideas, backgrounds, or gifts. Here we are made richer we share our many gifts. Here, we feast on one bread and one cup and become one body in service to the world.

(from SANTO – a Bilingual Communion Rite – Marty Haugen and Susan Briehl)

Blessed are you, Holy God, from the rising of the sun to it setting, we bless your holy name. You set creation's table with the bounty of your goodness and satisfy the needs of every living thing. You gather the peoples of the earth from east and west, north and south, to feast on your promise and your presence made known to us in your son, Jesus.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thank; broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: "Take and eat; this is my body given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: "This cup is the new covenant in my blood shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Remembering therefore Christ's birth among us, his eating with sinners and outcasts, his death and resurrection, we await the feast that has no end. Pour out, we pray, your Holy Spirit upon these gifts of bread and wine (cup) and all who are nourished at your table, that we might become what we receive – Christ's body, blessed, broken and given for the sake of the life of the world.

Through him all glory and honor is yours, with the Holy Spirit, in your holy Church, both now and forever. Amen

Eucharistic Prayer (IONA)

The table of bread and wine is now ready, the table of company with Jesus, and with all who love him. It's the table of sharing with the poor of the world, with whom Jesus identified. It's the table of communion with the earth, in which Christ became a human being like us.

So come to this table, you who have much faith, and you who would like to have more; you who have been here often, and you who have not been here for a long time; you who have tried to follow Jesus and feel like you have failed. Come, it is Jesus who invites us to meet him here. It is Jesus who is known to us in the breaking of the bread who on that night as he sat sharing a meal with his disciples, took the bread, gave thanks, broke it and gave it to his disciples saying, "This is my body, given for you. Do this as you remember me".

In the same way, he took the cup, and gave thanks, and gave it to them to drink saying,

"This cup is the new covenant in my blood that is shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of your sin."

Do this as you remember me.

So now, as we gather around this table, may God's Spirit transform us to be the body of the risen Christ in this world to serve in his name. May we live into this new relationship gained from the gift of forgiveness and love shared. Then gathered into one by the Holy Spirit we pray together:

With grateful hearts we commend our spoken and silent prayers to you, O God; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

October 23 - 20th Sunday after Pentecost

Other People - In a story of two prayers, we find new ways to practice humility rather than worrying so much about what other people might be doing.
