#### Planning Notes for Leaders

#### Season and Lectionary

On Sunday June 11th, we transition to a new season of the Church Year, that long season of green that arrives with summer each year. Often this long season is called the second half of the liturgical calendar. The first half beginning with Advent and takes us all the way to Pentecost Sunday. Throughout the first half of the year we tell the story of Jesus' life and ministry. From Mary's pregnancy in Advent through Jesus' baptism, journey to Jerusalem, and passion. In Easter we hear resurrection stories and by the end of the season we transition to focusing on the community of disciples preparing to be the Body of Christ in the world. It is a whirlwind of movement and narrative!

In the second half of the calendar comes the long season of Green where we slow down the pace of the action. Rather than an over-arching story of Jesus' life, we focus on Jesus' teaching, parables, miracles and other vignettes from his years of ministry.

Green Sundays are often colloquially referred to as Pentecost Sundays, though this is technically incorrect. They are Sundays AFTER Pentecost, which is a season that lasts just one day - the 50th day after Easter Sunday. The long season of green doesn't have a proper name, but the most accurate term is 'Ordinary Time.' The season is not ordinary as in boring or average, but rather ordinary refers to 'ordinal time' or counting time. We literally count the Sundays after Pentecost and we begin with the second Sunday after Pentecost on June 11th. We will continue counting until the final green Sunday on November 19th, the twenty-fifth Sunday after Pentecost. Almost half a calendar year!

In Lectionary Year A our focus is the Gospel of Matthew, beginning with Jesus' call to the first disciples. Matthew's gospel was written to the Hebrew community living in Jerusalem, contending with how to be followers of Jesus living in heart and holy city of the Hebrew faith. Throughout the Gospel, Matthew is often trying to demonstrate how Jesus fulfills the messianic prophecies of the Torah and Tanakh (Old Testament).

Another feature of the readings for Ordinary Time is that there is a choice for the First reading and Psalm to be made between the Thematic set of readings and the Semi-Continuous. The official lectionary of the ELCIC is the Semi-Continuous option, but our sibling church to the south the ELCA uses the Thematic readings. Thus the Thematic set is often the default when using Sundays and Seasons planning tools. The Thematic first reading and Psalm are chosen to fit the theme of the Gospel reading thus might jump around from book to book in the Old Testament. The Semi-Continuous usually follows readings connected to one other (this year beginning with the story of the call of Abram and Sarai, and following with the stories of their descendants) but might not obviously fit the themes of the Gospel reading.

#### Seasonal visuals and music

The colour for Ordinary Time is Green. Given the length of the season, a possible variation throughout would be to begin with light shades of green for vestments, paraments and other fabric decor. Throughout the season or part-way through changes to darker and darker greens can mark the passage of time. Potted plants and flowers may also feature prominently in the seasonal decorations.

Given the variety and open nature of the season, Ordinary Time is the chance to choose all the music that isn't particularly connected to other seasons. Often there are hymns and songs that speak to particular Gospel texts or other readings. There also might be other music that connects with the green theme of growing and nature during this time.

#### Seasonal variations on the liturgy

Ordinary Time is usually a chance to simplify the liturgy, particularly during the summer months.

Ordinary Time can be a time to play with omitting the Kyrie or Hymn of Praise or both. Other hymns may be substituted in their place, or a simpler service that moves from Apostolic Greeting to the Prayer of the Day is also possible.

In the season of Ordinary Time the Apostle's Creed is normally used.

Other liturgies may be acceptable on Sunday mornings such as Morning Prayer.

Special hymn choices for a set time might be advisable, such as the same call to worship or offertory during a period of 4 or 6 weeks, or even through all the summer months.

The seasonal prayer options provided by Sundays and Seasons for Confession and Forgiveness, the Offering Prayer, the Thanksgiving at the Table and the Blessing will often contain themes related to the Gospel stories of the season and/or related to growing and new life.
